Ans.(b) Sol. Parched: dried out with heat. Arid: (of land or a climate) having little or no rain; too dry or barren to support vegetation. Stifling: (of heat, air, or a room) very hot and causing difficulties in breathing; suffocating. Hence option B fits in the context.

Q7. Their rivers and reservoirs withrain. (a) jollity (b) delectated (c) inundated (d) bountiful
Ans.(d) Sol. Jollity(noun): lively and cheerful activity or celebration. Delectate (verb): to obtain pleasure from or take pleasure in something. Inundate(verb): flood Bountiful (adjective): large in quantity; abundant. Hence option D is the right usage.
Q8. One of them is Gujarat, which is by the long-tail effect (a) interrupted (b) roiled (c) reviled (d) stile
Ans.(b) Sol. Roil(verb): to move turbulently: be in a state of turbulence or agitation. Revile(verb): criticize in an abusive or angrily insulting manner. Stile(noun): an arrangement of steps that allows people but not animals to climb over a fence or wall. Hence option B fits in the context.
Q9. Of amonsoon between August and November last year. (a) opulent (b) defected (c) deficit (d) unwanted
Ans.(c) Sol. Opulent: amply or plentifully provided often to the point of ostentation. Deficit: shortfall; deficiency. Hence option C fits in the context.
Q10. Itsreflects the larger reality of drought in India, aggravated by heat waves and significant rain deficits in different regions. (a) breakthrough (b) tumult (c) predicament (d) impasse
Ans.(c) Sol. Breakthrough: an instance of achieving success in a particular sphere or activity. Tumult: a loud, confused noise, especially one caused by a large mass of people.

Predicament: a difficult or unpleasant situation.

Impasse: a situation in which no progress is possible, especially because of disagreement. Hence Option C fits in the context.

Ans.(b)'To' will not be used because – made indicates forcing someone to do something one does not want to do. Direct infinitive is used after the verbs like- let, bid, make, know, help etc.

33. My parents asked me (1)/ that how long (2)/ I would stay there. (3)/ No error (4).

Ans.(b)'That' will not be used because in Indirect Speech of Interrogative Sentences, 'that' is not used. When a question begins with a question word (what, who, whom, when, where, why, how, etc.) the same word is used to introduce the question in the Indirect Speech.

34. As a chef (1)/ Kajal is as good (2)/, if not better than Mahender. (3)/ No error (4).

Ans.(b) 'as good as' will replace 'as good'. 'As good as' is an idiom which means nearly.

35. I laughed on (1)/ her as she fell off the (2)/ tree and got injured. (3)/ No error (4).

Ans.(a)Replace "on her" with "at her" as 'laugh' agrees with preposition "at".

36. Jyoti is so obstinate (1)/ that no one can (2)/ altar her views. (3)/ No error (4).

Ans.(c) Replace 'altar' with 'alter'. Altar means place of worship whereas Alter means change.

37. The Government has declared (1)/that it will launch a three-crores rupees project (2)/ within the next few days. (3)/No error (4)

Ans.(b)'Three – crore' will replace 'three – crores' because –In hyphenated Compound Adjectives, the Noun is used in Singular form. Hence, this three-crore project is the right usage.

38. India has never attacked on any country, (1)/ nor has it ever coveted anyone's territory but (2)/ made supreme sacrifice fighting for others. (3)/ No error (4)

Ans.(a)Drop "on" before 'any country' as no preposition is used after some verbs when these verbs are used in active voice. Example: stress, emphasise, discuss, attack etc.

39. It was in the basis of the new constitution that (1)/ the Committee of Administrators (CoA) and the Electoral Officer (2)/ conducted the BCCI elections on October 23. (3)/ No error (4)

Ans(a)The error is in part 'A' of the sentence as the correct phrase to be used is "on the basis of" which means "because of a particular fact or situation (based on)". So, consider replacing "in" with "on".

40. The students cared (1)/ a little about the (2)/ consequences of their protest. (3)/ No error (4)

Ans(b)Little, as an adverb, is used in a negative sense to mean 'almost not'. Whereas, 'a little' is used in an affirmative sense to mean "slightly or somewhat". In the given sentence, replace "a little" with "little" as the sense of the sentence is: "The students did not care about the consequences of their protest".
