Sol. "Had" will replace "has" because – Use of 'as if' indicates an imaginary situation or a situation that may not be true. The Verb after 'as if' is always in the Past Subjunctive.

Sol. Replace "to" by "in" because "hand in glove" is an idiom which means working together,

Sol. Replace 'comparing' with 'comparable'. As we need an 'adjective' not a 'verb' to make the comparison.

Comparing (verb): estimate, measure, or note the similarity or dissimilarity between. Comparable (adjective): able to be likened to another; similar.

Sol. Replace 'enablity' with 'inability'. Inability: the state of being unable to do something.

Sol. Replace "will" with "would". In Indirect Speech, Will changes into Would when the Direct Speech is in Future Tense.

The word "rainfall" after the first blank indicates that the word describes the state of rainfall patterns. In the context of the sentence, the words which are suitable for the first blank are "variability", "fluctuations" and "uncertainty". Hence options B and E are eliminated. The second blank tries to convey that it is important to "transparently manage water resources". The only word that makes the sentence meaningfully correct is "imperative" which means 'of vital importance; crucial'. The words "inefficient" and "indifferent" are irrelevant to the context of this sentence. This eliminates options C and D as well. Option A is hence the correct answer. 44. The short-term priority is to remove _____ clauses in policies and _____ coverage to as many people as possible. (a) defamatory, exempt (b) discriminatory, expand (c) enriching, withheld (d) degrading, magnifies (e) boring, stop Ans(b) The sentence refers to removal of clauses that have negative intent. Hence, "defamatory", "discriminatory", and "degrading" would fit in the first blank. Hence, options C and E can be eliminated. The latter part of the sentence goes on to say that after the removal of the aforementioned clauses, the coverage of the policies should be increased. So, the appropriate word here would be "expand", making option B the correct answer. Option D would have been correct if it was "magnify" instead of "magnifies". Option B is hence the correct answer.

I was lying on a ridge scanning, with field glasses, a rock cliff opposite me for tahr, the most sure footed of all Himalayan goats. On a ledge halfway up the cliff, a tahr and her kid were lying asleep. Then, the tahr got to her feet, stretched herself, and the kid immediately began to feed. After a minute the mother freed herself, took a few steps along the ledge, poised for a moment, then jumped down on to another but a narrower ledge some twelve to fifteen feet below her. As soon as it was left alone the kid started running backward and forwards, stopping every now and then to peer down at its mother, but unable to summon the courage to jump down to her, for below the narrow ledge was a sheer drop of a thousand feet.
