Ans.(b)

Sol. To qualify the noun 'recovery', we need the adjective 'economic' not the noun 'economics' to place before it.

Also we have been provided with two adjectives 'economic' & 'economical' in options B & C respectively.

But 'economical' means not using a lot of money, energy, etc. It doesn't fit in the context.

7. He started at the (bottom rung of the ladder) and then gained success.

- (a) bottom rung of the stair
- (b) lower rung of the ladder
- (c) lower rung of the stair
- (d) No improvement

Ans.(d) Sol. No improvement

8. He said that the (two barrage on rivers) Kosi and Gandaki near the India-Nepal border are operated by Indian authorities.

- (a) two barrages in rivers
- (b) two barrages on rivers
- (c) two barrages under rivers
- (d) No improvement

Ans.(b)

Sol. Plural noun 'barrages' will be used after plural count 'two'. And barrages are made 'on' rivers. Hence option B is correct.

9. The issue was not resolved, but the discussion (was helped in realizing) the growing distance between the two strands of thought and the strain of this on the information ecology.

- (a) helped to realize to
- (b) was helped to realize
- (c) helped in realizing
- (d) No improvement

Ans.(c)

Sol. No passive voice is required in the bracketed part. Hence option C is correct that makes the sentence grammatically correct and meaningful.

10. Higher crude oil prices have doubtlessly provided a significant fiscal boost in the past several months, although any (flair on) going forward can lead to a price spiral that would have other untoward consequences as well.

- (a) flair in
- (b) flare at
- (c) flare up

Ans.(c)

Sol. Flare up: a sudden outburst of something.

In the following questions, change the Statements given in Direct Speech form into Indirect Speech or vice versa, with the help of given four options (A), (B), (C), (D).

11. He said to me, "Don't go out".

- (a) He forbade me to not to go out.
- (b) He forbade me to go out.
- (c) He forbade me not to go out.
- (d) He forbade me to not go out.

Ans.(b) Sol. Conversion Rule is: Sub + forbade/forbid + object + to + V_1 . Note: 'forbid' won't take negative words 'no', 'not' with it. Hence option B fits in the context.

12. Ram said to his boss, "Let me go home."

(a) Ram requested his boss to allow him to go home.

- (b) Ram requested to his boss to allow him to go home.
- (c) Ram requested his boss that he should go home.
- (d) Ram requested his boss to allow him for going home.

Ans.(a) Sol. When 'Let' is used to allow in Reported Speech of Direct Narration. Then Conversion Rule is: Sub + requested/ordered + object + to allow + Sub + to + V_1 + object +

In these questions a sentence has been given in Active/Passive Voice. Out of the four alternatives suggested below, select the one which best expresses the same sentence in Passive/Active Voice.

13. People claim to have seen the suspect in several cities.

- (a) The suspect is being seen in several cities.
- (b) The suspect is claimed to have been seen in several cities.
- (c) The suspect is claimed to be seen in several cities.

Ans.(b) Sol. Present Indefinite Tense in Active Voice changes to 'is/am/ are + V3' in Passive Voice and Present Perfect Tense in Active Voice 'has /have + V3' changes to 'has/ have + been + V3' in Passive Voice. Rest conversion rule is same. Hence option B fits in the context.

14. She was to sell the watch.

- (a) The watch to be sold by her.
- (b) The watch was to be sold by her.
- (c) The watch was to sold by her.
- (d) The watch had to be sold by her.

Ans.(b) Sol. Active Voice: Subject + is/am/are/was/were + to + V1 (1st form) + object. Passive Voice: Object + is/am/are/was/were (according to the object=new subject) + to + be + V3 (3rd form) + by subject.

Ans.(d). In optative sentences, reporting verb 'said' in direct speech will be written as 'exclaimed with joy' in indirect speech. And Reported speech in Present perfect Tense in Direct Speech \rightarrow Reported Speech in Past Perfect Tense in Indirect Speech.

18. Robert said to me, "If I hear any news, I'll phone you."

Ans(d) The reported speech contains two forms: simple present in the sub-ordinate clause and simple future in the principal clause which will change into simple past and simple future consecutively due to the past tense in the reporting speech.
